 - c) A woman's gentle heart, but not acquainted With shifting change, as is false women's fashion:

 To cease upon the midnight with no pain,
 While thou art pouring forth thy soul abroad
 In such an ecstasy!.

- 4) Would you consider Shakespeare's Sonnets as poems of physical love? Take three poems you have studied and discuss.
- The narrator in John Donne's *Holy Sonnets* fears mortality. Do you agree? Take examples from three *Holy Sonnets* and argue your case..
- 6) Hopkins's *Dark Sonnets* depict a narrator's serious dissatisfaction with his own life. Do you agree? Discuss using three Sonnets you have studied.
- 7) Keats's poems seemingly consider life to be elsewhere. Take three poems from Keats and explore this statement.
- 8) Would you consider Eliot's *Alfred Prufrock* as a character who is seeking something bigger than his own existence? Argue with close reference to the text.
- 9) Critically examine the character of the young priest in Synge's *Rider's to the Sea*. Use the text as your focus and discuss.
